MEMORIAL DAY



As we all know, Memorial Day is more than a 3-Day weekend and a BBQ. Here are a few facts found in an article at www.CNN.com, written by David Holzel that helps bring out the true meaning and purpose of one of our favorite holidays.

It started with the Civil War

Memorial Day was a response to the unprecedented carnage of the Civil War, in which some 620,000 soldiers on both side died. The loss of life and its effect on communities throughout the North and South, led to spontaneous commemorations of the dead:

- In 1864, women from Boalsburg, Pennsylvania, put flowers on the graves of their dead from the just-fought Battle of Gettysburg. The next year, a group of women decorated the graves of soldiers buried in a Vicksburg, Mississippi Cemetery.
- In April 1866, women from Columbus, Mississippi, laid flowers on the graves of both Union and Confederate soldiers. It was recognized at the time as an act of healing regional wounds. In the same month, in Carbondale, Illinois, 219 Civil War veterans marched through town in memory of the fallen, to Woodlawn Cemetery, where Union hero Maj. Gen. John A. Logan delivered the principal address. The ceremony gave Carbondale its claim to the first organized, community-wide Memorial Day observance.

General Logan made it official

Gen. Logan, the speaker at the Carbondale gathering, also was commander of the Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.), an organization of Union veterans. On May 5, 1868, he issued General Order No. 11, which set aside May 30, 1868, "for the purpose of strewing with flowers, or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion". The order expressed hope that the observance would be "kept up from year to year while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades".

It was first known as Decoration Day

From the practice of decorating graves with flowers, wreaths, and flags, the holiday was long known as Decoration Day. The name Memorial Day goes back to 1882, but the older name didn't disappear until after World War II. Federal law declared "Memorial Day" the official name in 1967.

He also had his Army-Air Corp wings and prior to coming to Miami, OK he had flown cargo planes in the "Hump" of Burma/China. Gasoline, mules, and Chinese soldiers were the cargo in those days. By the time he got the opportunity to train on the Spitfires he was a first lieutenant with a lot of flying experience.





Both of my parents passed away some time ago and even though I knew what he had done during the war it really didn't interest me until recently when our 17 year old Grandson got his private pilot license and began to ask about his Great Grandfather and his flying experience.


As best I can piece together from what documents/pictures I inherited, he graduated in class number 19 on June 27, 1944. He never went to combat in the fighters as the war was winding down.

If I feel that I have left some questions unanswered, I will put them in contact with other resources to assist them with their search. I do this unconditionally, without the thought of any type of recognition at all. ... Who Louis Hart Austin was?

According to Texas Convict Records from 1913, Herman Franklin Smith was born in 1891 in Indian Territory, which is in contradiction with his grave marker. Herman was listed with his alias as having part of his ear missing from a gunshot wound which is said he had received in a shoot out in New Orleans with the police. This is visible in the photo to the left.

... He was also known as the "Alibi King"

✓ On 12 Feb 1927, Austin's indictments are ordered "nolle prossed" (To drop charges against) and he is released immediately with two verdicts of not guilty when he produces his signature on a Miami, Florida hotel register.

... Who he was known to be associated with?

✓ Austin had been known to have connections with notorious gangsters such as... George "Machine Gun" Kelly, "Connie" Ritter, Jack Dillon, The Nolan Gang and many others.

"Not a great deal is known about Louis H Austin after his arrest and association with George "Machine Gun" Kelly In 1933. It is noted in one article written at the time about the crime ring that "they scattered" across the country because of the heat brought on them by the police. If records exist for him after this time, it is back in Miami, Oklahoma where he lists his address on his 1942 WWII Draft registration. He lists no occupation and his mother Minerva as a contact. Maybe he lived the remainder of his life quietly there in his hometown with his mother and family. Research still continues to fill in the gaps, but this man has lead my life on a whirlwind of journeys into the prohibition era criminal underworld. Austin is just one part of the story I'm working on... there were at least 6 other men whom I have the same if not more info on. I hope to compile it all in an eBook based on my research that began with a small town bank robbery. They were real men with real families and normal everyday lives who held secrets that sometimes even their closest family members didn't know." ~ Michele
